Mackenzie Harris, daughter of Shina & Mike Harris of Richford, has been named Valedictorian of the Newark Valley High School Class of 2014.

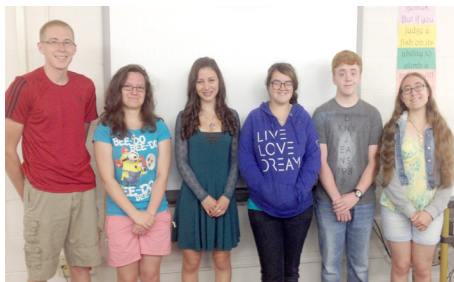

NV Receives Grant to Create New Learning Center

Our district is extremely excited to announce that we have received, and the school board has accepted, a grant from The Hooker Foundation to implement a unique classroom environment in the high school.

The \$75,000 grant we were awarded from The Hooker Foundation to start a student-run enterprise, a café, in the high school library is allowing us to purposefully improve, update, and add to curriculum, developing student skills that are connected to the real world. This café will be the hub of authentic learning for several student groups.

The goal of a student-run enterprise originated from the district's desire to create authentic experiences tied to curriculum and to create an avenue for students to earn the work-based CDOS requirement now required by NYS. This summer, the Business Department, led by Mary McCloe, and the Special Education Department, led by Cathleen Stewart, will be working on integrating the Café into course work, including Business Math and Accounting.

We will explore additional areas of our curriculum that could also offer authentic learning experiences connected to the café. Those possibilities include, but are not limited to:

- English 9 will partner with Grade 12 Economics students to survey our student body to determine what products to sell.
- Math 9 will partner with Grade 12 Statistics students to evaluate data collected and report findings.
- Business Math students will study cost of items to be sold and create a Mark-Up Report.
- Students who attend BOCES for Culinary Arts will be

asked to evaluate food service set up design, make recommendations before finalizing our Café layout, and prepare meals for volunteer work days.

- Accounting students, overseen by the Business Teacher, will keep the books, order product, monitor inventory, etc.
- Business Club students, supervised by the Business Teacher, will work as managers overseeing student scheduling assignments, daily cash drawer intake, on-site trouble shooting etc.
- CDOS students, supervised by Special Education Teaching Assistant and overseen by the Career Transition Coordinator, will work during free periods on goals specific to their Individualized Education Plans.

While these are powerful learning objectives for work readiness, the district will also strive to achieve two national credentials for the self-sustaining café: The National Work Readiness Credential, and The Customer Service Credential. The possibilities are virtually limitless.

With the aid of the high school's café steering committee, Career Transition Coordinator, Debra Demers, Michelle Bombard, Gary Hoskins, and community volunteer, Mr. Michael Cucci, who has used his architecture skills to draw up our café floor plans, the vision of a unique learning space that will benefit all students is well underway.

We are extremely fortunate that The Hooker Foundation recognizes the value of this endeavor and that our school and community supports us in offering students unique opportunities that are truly visionary.

HS Music Students Represent NV Well During Trip to Boston

This past Spring, 40 NV Music students participated in competition in Boston. They represented the Select Choir, Women's Octet and Jazz Ensemble. Each ensemble put on their best possible performance receiving excellent scores. The Select Choir came in 2nd place (by only 1.7 points) in the mixed chorus category and the Women's Octet came in 1st place in the women's choir category. The Jazz Ensemble placed first in the Jazz category and Micah Gorsline won best Instrumental soloist.

In addition to competing, the group spent time exploring the history and culture of Boston. Students enjoyed connecting some of the things they had learned previously with what they were seeing first hand. For example, while in Salem many of our students related what they saw at the Witch Museum with *The Crucible*. They enjoyed seeing the church steeple where Paul

Revere was signaled to go out on his famous ride and the courthouse where the Boston Massacre occurred.

At the Aquarium students saw many different nautical life-forms and learned about the steps the people in the South Pacific are taking to restore their ocean life. Kids even snuck in a little bit of math when learning why the ramps going into The TD Garden were built at a 33 degree angle!

Every student attending was kind, polite, and handled every new situation with maturity, proving excellent representative of Newark Valley Schools.

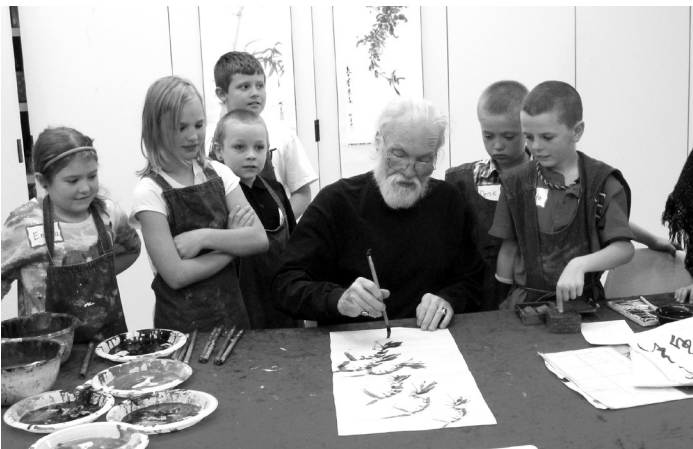
nese language. They spent the other half of the morning learning about Chinese painting from Professor Jim Hardesty.

Sixth Grade Boys Place First in State

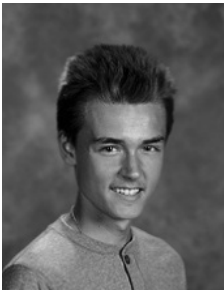
Congratulations to upcoming 7th graders Collin Creeley, Riley Malone and Joshua Post! The boys placed 1st at the State level in a National science competition's 6th grade division. eCYBERMISSION is a web-based Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics competition for 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th grade teams. Each team proposes a solution to a real problem in their community and then competes for State, Regional and National Awards. This type of 'real world' problem solving challenges students to explore how Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics work in the world.

Collin, Riley and Josh chose to explore the deliberate extermination of coyotes as these animals move into suburban and even urban areas of New York. The boys hypothesized that the killing of these animals was done out of ignorance and fear. They designed an experiment in which they measured children's feelings of fear and tendency toward acts of violence against coyotes and then educated these same children about the animals in general. After the intervention (the education about coyotes) they found that students' feels of fear and tendency toward aggressive behavior against the animals significantly dropped. This has interesting implications for wildlife management but also has broader reaching implications for human behavior in general.

In addition to a tremendous amount of reading related to the coyote population and what impact their deliberate extermination has on the ecosystem, the boys also collaborated with internationally renowned coyote expert, Paul D. Curtis. Dr. Curtis serves as Extension Wildlife Specialist in the Department of Natural Resources at Cornell University. His applied research and extension programs have focused on reducing human-wildlife conflicts in agricultural and suburban landscapes. His work includes community-based wildlife management issues and public policy education. Dr. Curtis was a tremendous asset to our students and was a wonderfully supportive and encouraging guide and the students were so grateful for his input. The boys engaged in skype meetings with Dr. Curtis and communicated with him via email.

All three boys have received college scholarships for their 1st place win and are thrilled with their accomplishment.

School Notice to Parents of Rights Under The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal Law, requires that Newark Valley CSD with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Newark Valley CSD may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with district procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Newark Valley CSD to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll and other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, the New York State Education Law § 2-1 and two federal laws require school districts receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with student names, addresses and telephone listings – unless parents have advised the school district that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Newark Valley CSD to disclose some or all directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the district in writing within 30 days after the publication of this notice. Newark Valley CSD has designated the following information as directory information: [Note: Newark Valley CSD may, but does not have to, include all the information listed below.]

Everyone in the Transportation Department hopes you are having a safe and enjoyable summer. The beginning of the school year is just around the corner and everyone in the bus garage is gearing up for the new year by making bus repairs, setting up the bus routes, and many other summer duties.

Please keep in mind we may have to revise these times after school has started.

- It is against the law to pass through the red lights of a school bus. This is the case whether it be on the road at a bus stop or in the school parking lot.

- If for whatever reason your student will not be riding the bus on a certain day, please give us a call.

- If you have to change a drop off location, you have to notify the school so that a bus pass can be issued.

Notification of Rights Under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Schools

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

(1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the school receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes is inaccurate.

Parents or eligible students may ask the school to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the stu-

dent's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the school has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the school discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.

(4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Newark Valley Central School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are: Family Policy Compliance Officer, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20202-4605.

School Tax Collection Procedure

2014-2015 school tax bills will be mailed to district property owners. Tax bills paid on or before October 1, 2014 are not subject to a 2 percent late penalty.

Tax bills paid during the period of October 2 to October 31, 2014 require the additional late fee of 2 percent. No school tax payments will be accepted by the school district after October 31, 2014. Unpaid school taxes on November 1, 2014 are returned to the county for inclusion in the January Town and County tax bill.

School taxes may be paid by mail or in person. If paying in person, the tax collection office is located at the District Office, 79 Whig Street, Newark Valley. Collection hours are:

Discipline Code - Student Conduct

The Board of Education of the Newark Valley Central School District is committed to providing a safe and orderly school environment where students may receive, and district personnel may deliver, quality educational service without disruption or interference. Each school must be a positive forum in which students can express and explore different points of view in a peaceful and constructive manner.

The district has a long-standing set of expectations for conduct by students based on the principles of civility, mutual respect, citizenship, character, tolerance, honesty, and integrity. This policy is intended to support and supplement the efforts of teachers to ensure effective instruction. Accordingly, the focus of the policy is on changing student behavior for the better, not merely punishing unacceptable or disruptive behavior.

The Board recognizes the need to clearly define expectation for acceptable behavior by students when on school property or attending a school function. To that end, the Board adopts this Student Conduct Policy.

I. Prohibited Student Conduct

The Board of Education expects all students to conduct themselves in an appropriate and civil manner, with proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students, district personnel and other members of the school community, and for the care of school facilities and equipment.

The best discipline is self-imposed, and students must learn to assume and accept responsibility for their own behavior, as well as the consequences of their misbehavior. District personnel who interact with students are expected to use disciplinary action only when necessary and to place emphasis "on the students' ability to grown in self-discipline.

The Board recognizes the need to make its expectations for student conduct while on school property or engaged in a school function specific and clear. The rules of conduct listed below are intended to do that and focus on safety and respect for the rights and property of others. Students who will not accept responsibility for their own behavior and who violate these school rules will be required to accept the penalties for their conduct.

A student may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension from school, when they:

A. Engage in conduct that is disorderly. Examples of disorderly conduct include:

1. Running in the hallways.
2. Making unreasonable noise.
3. Using language or gestures that are profane, lewd, vulgar, or abusive.
4. Obstructing vehicular or pedestrian traffic.
5. Engaging in any willful act that disrupts the normal operation of the school community.
6. Trespassing. Students are not permitted in any school building, other than the one they regularly attend, without permission from the administrator in charge of the building.
7. Computer/electronic communications misuse, including any unauthorized use of computers, software, or internet/intranet account; accessing

inappropriate websites; or any other violation of the district's acceptable use policy

B. Engage in conduct that is insubordinate. Examples of insubordinate conduct include:

1. Failing to comply with the reasonable directions of teachers, school administrators or other school employees in charge of students or otherwise demonstrating disrespect.
2. Lateness for, missing or leaving school or class without permission.
3. Skipping detention.

C. Engage in conduct that is disruptive. Examples of disruptive conduct include:

1. Failing to comply with the reasonable directions of teachers, school administrators or other personnel in charge of students.

D. Engage in conduct that is violent. Examples of violent conduct include:

1. Committing or threatening to commit an act of violence (such as hitting, kicking, punching or scratching) upon a teacher, administrator or other school employee, or attempting to do so.
2. Committing an act of violence (such as hitting, kicking, punching or scratching) upon another student or any other person lawfully on school property or attempting to do so.
3. Possessing a weapon. Authorized law enforcement officials are the only persons permitted to have a weapon in their possession while on school property or at a school function.
4. Displaying what appears to be a weapon.
5. Threatening to use any weapon.
6. Intentionally damaging or destroying the personal property of a teacher, administrator, other district employee, another student or any other person on school property.
7. Intentionally damaging or destroying school district property, including graffiti or arson.

E. Engage in any conduct that endangers the safety, morals, health or welfare of others. Examples of such conduct include:

1. Lying to school personnel.
2. Stealing the property of other students, school personnel or any other person lawfully on school property or attending a school function.
3. Defamation, which includes making false or unprivileged statements or representations about an individual or identifiable group of individuals that harm the reputation of the person or the identifiable group demeaning.
4. Intimidation, which includes engaging in actions or statements that put an individual in fear of bodily harm.
5. Hazing, which includes any intentional or reckless act directed against another for the purpose of initiation into, affiliating with or maintaining membership in any school sponsored activity,

- organization, club or team.
6. Selling, using, or possessing obscene material.
 7. Using vulgar or abusive language, cursing or swearing.
 8. Smoking a cigarette, cigar or pipe or using chewing or smokeless tobacco.
 9. Possessing, consuming, selling, distributing or exchanging alcoholic beverages or illegal substances, drug paraphernalia or being under the influence of either. "Illegal substances" include, but are not limited to, inhalants, marijuana, cocaine, LSD, PCP, amphetamines, heroin, steroids, look-alike drugs, and any substances commonly referred to as "designer drugs".
 10. Inappropriately using or sharing prescription or over the counter drugs.
 11. Gambling
 12. Indecent exposure, this is exposure to sight of the private parts of the body in a lewd or indecent manner.
 13. Initiating a report warning of fire or other catastrophe without valid cause, misuse of 911, or discharging a fire extinguisher.
- F. Engage in misconduct while on a school bus. It is crucial for students to behave appropriately while riding on district buses to ensure their safety and that of other passengers and to avoid distracting the bus driver. Students are required to conduct themselves on the bus in a manner consistent with established standards for classroom behavior. Excessive noise, pushing, shoving, fighting, and the use of vulgar or abusive language, cursing or swearing, or inappropriate sexual behavior will not be tolerated.
- G. Engage in any form of educational misconduct. Examples of academic misconduct include:
1. Plagiarism
 2. Cheating
 3. Copying
 4. Altering records
 5. Assisting another student in any of the above actions
- H. Engaging in any act of discrimination or harassment as defined in this code.

Dignity for All Students Act Compliance

The Newark Valley Central School District hereby advises students, parents, employees, and the general public that, it offers educational opportunities, including vocational education opportunities, without regard to sex, race, color, national origin, weight, ethnic group, sexual orientation (real or perceived) or handicap. Grievances in violation of the Dignity for All Students Act of 2010 should be brought to the attention of the Dignity for All Students Coordinator, Robert Rodgers, Principal, NTH School, 607-642-3340.

Pupil Insurance Procedures

In order to receive benefits based on the District's Student Accident Policy, you must first submit all medical bills to your own health insurance carrier providing your primary coverage. Student Accident Insurance is intended to be a supplemental coverage to your primary carrier, therefore benefits will not be paid for medical expenses covered by your own health insurance. The District's Student Accident Insurance is underwritten by Pupil Benefits Plan, Inc. In order to claim expenses not covered by your health insurance, the following steps must be followed:

1. School fills out the "School Section" of the claim form.

2. All items on back of the Claim Form must be completed by parent or guardian.

3. Attach a notice of payment or rejection form from your health insurance carrier to the claim form. Keep copies of these for your records prior to submitting.

4. Submit the completed claim form within 90 days from the date of injury along with any itemized bills (paid or unpaid) that you may have.

5. Please contact all physicians, hospitals, and any other health care providers who have treated or will be treating your child and give them the insurance information about the school's accident insurance carrier, and ask them to bill the company as the secondary insurance at:

All checks from Pupil Benefits Plan, Inc. will be mailed directly to the PROVIDER and NOT to the school or parent/guardian. As stated previously, the District's Student Accident Insurance is supplemental insurance coverage. For this reason, your medical expenses may not be paid in full. For the exact coverage you can expect, please refer to the blue PARENT INFORMATION BROCHURE that will be mailed along with the Claim Form from the school. Health Office News

1. New York education law requires a written excuse for every absence, tardy or early dismissal. Please be sure you send a note with your child. Just a reminder that if you do not send a written excuse, the absence will be considered an unexcused absence. Excessive unexcused absences can be considered educational neglect.

2. Please, if your child is going to be absent, call the school and inform them. This does not take the place of a written note, but it does save the school from trying to contact you regarding your child's absence. (NTH 642-3340; MS 642-5524; HS 642-8351)

4. New York state requires physicals for students entering the following grades: kindergarten, 2nd, 4th, 7th and 10th. Students in 7th grade and 10th grade who have a current physical for sports do not need another physical. Students that do not have a physical with their family physician will be scheduled in October to have one with the school health provider.

5. Sport physicals- students must have a current (within the past 12 months) physical by the first day of practice. Sport physicals for winter sports will be scheduled in October, spring sports in February and next fall sports in April and May. If your child chooses not to have a physical with the school health provider, please contact your family physician and make an appointment before the start of the sport season.

6. The Tioga County dental van is scheduled to visit all 3 schools. As soon as the schedule is available, the school nurses will notify parents. This service is available for just a short time at each school.

7. Substitute nurses- the district is in need of substitute nurses for all 3 school buildings.

Pesticide Application Notification

New York State Education Law Section 409-H and Commissioner of Education Regulation 155.24, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Newark Valley Central School is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hrs following application
- anti-microbial products
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children
- silica gels and other non-volatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate
- the application of EPA designated biopesticides
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

* Written notification must be provided to all persons in parental relation and staff at the following intervals throughout the school year: at the beginning of the school year; within two school days of the end of winter recess; within two school days of the end of spring recess; within two days of the end of summer school and within ten days of the end of the school year.

Section 504 Annual Notice

In accordance with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 commonly known as Section 504, the Newark Valley Central School District hereby notifies disabled children and their parents of the School District's duty under the Regulations to Section 504.

Newark Valley School District shall provide a free appropriate public education to each qualified disabled child who resides in the Newark Valley Central School District regardless of the nature or severity of the disability. Newark Valley Central School District shall educate each qualified disabled child with children who are not disabled to the maximum extent appropriate to the needs of the disabled child, and shall also ensure that disabled children participate with non-disabled children in nonacademic and extra-curricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate. A disabled child shall be afforded an equal opportunity for participation in such services and activities.

Newark Valley Central School District shall provide disabled children an equal opportunity for participation in physical education courses, interscholastic, club or intramural athletics.

Newark Valley Central School District shall conduct pre-placement evaluations, and shall establish standards and procedures consistent with Section 104.35 for the evaluation and placement of children who need or are believed to need special education or related services. Periodic reevaluation shall be conducted of children who have been provided special education or related services.

Placement decisions shall draw upon information from a variety of sources and shall be made by a group of persons knowledgeable about the child, the meaning of the evaluation data, and the placement options. The Newark Valley Central School District shall establish and implement a system of procedural safeguards that includes notice, an opportunity for the parent to examine relevant records, an impartial hearing with the opportunity for participation by the parent and representation by counsel, and a review procedure.

Medication Policy

Pursuant to New York State Education Law, school nurses can not administer any medication without a doctor's written permission. This includes not only prescription medication, but also all over-the-counter medications such as Tylenol®, Caladryl®, cough drops, throat lozenges or spray, antiseptic ointments, etc. The school nurse can only administer these medications if the parents provide a note from the family physician, a note from the parent, and the medication in the original container marked with the student's name.

Newark Valley takes on AP Biology

This year, I've had the pleasure of pioneering Newark Valley's first Advanced Placement Biology Course. Seven brave and ambitious seniors signed on to join me in this adventure as we navigated the intense curriculum that is AP!



Kaitlin Coleman, Miranda Craft, Roman Steika, Derek Holcomb, Moriah Teed, Mackenzie Harris and Savannah Howland rose to every challenge I threw at them, and answered every suggestion with an even better idea. I have never worked with such a dedicated and cohesive group of kids who challenged and supported each other every step of the way. I've learned just as much from this experience as they have; probably more.

The College Board supplies a demanding curriculum, including several inquiry based labs in which the students design their own experiments to investigate central topics. Writing formal scientific reports, defending and presenting original research, communicating with professionals and statistical analysis for significance are just a few of the

new skills we honed this year. Many students come into class thinking biology is the "soft science." Let's just say, that's not the thought they leave with!

Establishing relevance to complicated concepts in the sciences can be challenging, but we were afforded an amazing and unique opportunity to do just that. With the help of IACUC Administrator Robert Felt, we visited four research laboratories at Cornell University. The research scientists graciously took the time to meet with these seven students and talk to them about working in the sciences, the particulars of their research and the importance of the college experience. Dr.



Robert Weiss, Dr. Robin Davisson, Dr. Deb Cherney, Mr. Scott Butler and Mr. Kevin Yager were the most amazing hosts we could have asked for! While visiting, we witnessed gene validation using electrophoresis, primary cell culture from mouse fibroblasts, a cow with a fistula in its rumen, ultrasound and neurosurgery techniques and a fairly sophisticated transgenic mouse facility. Al-

though I've worked at Cornell and in industry for nearly ten years, many of these things were new to me; we were fascinated!! In addition to tours, these internationally renowned scientists took their time to present their research to us at a level we could appreciate and understand. It has never been so evident how passionate professionals are about science education.

As we attempt to accelerate gifted eighth grade students in science, my hope is to encourage more students to take on the challenge of college-level biology during their senior year. High school level science, though invaluable, is not quite sufficient to prepare students for the rigor that follows in college. Even those students not necessarily interested in pursuing science could earn college credit toward a liberal arts degree, saving valuable money and time post-graduation!

I'm so grateful for this opportunity, and look forward to the years ahead. Thank you class of 2014, and best of luck in all that you do!
