

# Pre-K and Kindergarten Registration

Registration for the 2024 – 2025 school year for children who will be attending Pre-K and Kindergarten will be held the week of Monday, March 18, 2024, through Friday, March 22, 2024, from 9:30 a.m. – 3 p.m. daily. A registration packet may be obtained prior to our registration week at our NV website, www.nvcs.stier.org by scrolling down to find Nathan T. Hall Elementary School and clicking on the picture. You will then scroll down about halfway and will find the link for the registration packet listed on the right side of the page. You can also pick up a packet at the Nathan T. Hall Elementary School Office. Please bring the completed packet and all other requested paperwork with you to register your child.

Children turning five years old for kindergarten or four years old for Pre-kindergarten on or before Dec. 1, 2024, are eligible to register. Parents or guardians should bring their child's birth certificate, immunization records,

recent annual physical records, any legal or custody paperwork that we would need, and two proofs of residency to register. Parents are reminded that New York State law requires written proof that all students have immunization against polio, measles, diphtheria, mumps, rubella, varicella (chickenpox), and hepatitis B or medical verification of any of the above illnesses.

Please note: Children currently attending our Pre-K program do not need to register for kindergarten. Parents or guardians can call the Nathan T. Hall Elementary Office at (607) 642-3340 ext. 2 if you have any questions. Registering your child during our registration week helps the school determine classes and transportation needs for the coming school year. Once we have everyone registered, we will contact you to set up your child's screening.

# Two Newark Valley middle school students win 2023 Congressional App Challenge

Sixth graders Myah Whitney and Addison Neno have been announced as the winners of the 2023 congressional app challenge.

Both students came up with the idea for their app, which is called Chatter, from a sign language chart that is on the Newark Valley playground.

Their app helps people learn American sign language right on their phones or tablets. Their app is eligible to be displayed in the U.S. Capitol Building, and fees will be waived if they choose to copyright their app.

Representative Marc Molinaro selected the app as the winner of his 'Think DIFFERENTLY' initiative, which works to break down barriers for those with intellectual, developmental, and social disabilities.

Molinaro released a statement saying, "I am extremely proud of all of the talented local students who participated in the 2023 Congressional App Challenge and am excited to share that Myah Whitney and Addison Neno are our winners for their outstanding work to create an app that teaches people ASL in a fun way. It takes two to communicate, and it's inspiring to see Myah and Addison take on this challenge to help deaf and hard-of-hearing individuals communicate with others. This is Think DIFFERENTLY in Action; way to go!"

Of their app, the students told FOX 40 News, "There's a lot of people out there that, don't even know what sign language is said Addison Neno.

"We're going to continue our app and try to make it into an app that a lot of people use. And we're just going to try to expand the sign

language throughout the world," said Myah Whitney.

Congratulations, Myah and Addison. What a great accomplishment!

All of the students had such a blast during the fun day!














# Cooperation in Third Grade


