



Middle School Students Visit Lockheed

On October 2nd, Newark Valley students from 5th, 6th and 7th grades attended Manufacturing Day at Lockheed Martin where they participated in a number of fun and educational events.

During a Manufacturing Process Simulation, students were given an order form to order supplies they would need to manufacture their product and had to bring the order form to the “supply warehouse” which was set up at the back of the room. At the warehouse they were given a Snap Circuit Kit. Students were then instructed as to which products they were to manufacture out of their snap kit. Students created three different circuits that turned on fans, lights, and created a flying propeller.

During a Manufacturing Tour, students toured a pressurized manufacturing floor where employees assemble and test electronic parts for aircrafts. Students entering this area had to wear safety goggles and anti-static lab jackets. During this tour they saw employees assembling circuit boards, radar system screens, and circuit boards being sprayed with protective coating.

On another tour, students visited the welding facility, the subtractive manufacturing floor where they fabricate metal parts for many of the aircrafts, the 3D printing room where they were able to handle different pieces created in the 3D printer, and the painting booth area where they put the finishing touches on many of their parts.

Students also viewed short films about Lockheed Martin, additive and subtractive manufacturing, the future of 3D printing (additive manufacturing), and the products that are manufactured by Lockheed Martin, including parts for the President’s fleet of helicopters and various unmanned aircrafts.

At the end students were told about the number of jobs that Lockheed has added to the community over the last three years. An emphasis was put on the number of jobs they have that do not require a college degree. Many only require a High School Diploma, and often only require an additional Trade Certificate. It proved a very informative trip for all!

8th Grade Orientation at Alexander Pond

On September 25th, the 8th grade class (*pictured on cover*), along with teachers, counselors, and student mentors, attended a day long program at Alexander Pond. We had a beautiful day which started at the Middle School with students trying to locate their group facilitators by asking them three descriptive questions. Once all facilitators were found, we began our hike up to the pond from the Middle School. Students and staff immediately got to work with team building activities led by high school PE teacher Katie Brindisi, nature hikes, a scavenger hunt, a “getting to know you” activity, welcome to the High School activity led by our Cardinal mentors, and a drum circle led by Imagicka of Binghamton.

Our Cardinal Mentors (*below*) were, again, an invaluable addition to our day at Alexander Pond. Junior and Senior mentors were trained for facilitating several activities at the pond and they did a wonderful job! The 8th graders really connected and benefitted from hearing about life in the high school from peers who have already walked in their shoes. Throughout the year, mentors and mentees will be getting together for quick check-ins and fun activities.



Our day concluded with a hike back down the hill where the buses were waiting at the Middle School to take students back home or to after school activities at the High School. Thank you to everyone involved!

On October 2nd, the High School’s Guidance (Robin Novi) and Technology (Andrew Rice) departments took thirteen students to the First Annual Manufacturing Day, held at Raymond Corporation. We were welcomed by Raymond CEO Mike Field and given presentations by Rick Harrington, V.P. of U.S. Manufacturing, and Erric Heitmann, V.P. of Engineering. Students were also taken on a plant tour and shown demonstrations of procedures at Raymond. The purpose of this event was to expose students to what types of jobs are in the manufacturing world and how the field is growing. There is great demand for more people to go in to STEM careers, filling positions created by growth or vacated by retirement:

Several of our students who went on the trip remarked on how much of the information was new to them and/or how they had never before considered manufacturing as a career. This was a great educational trip for our students and advisors to become more aware of what is happening in our region, as well as the implications that it could have on our students’ futures.


