

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

I had the opportunity last week to serve as a judge for the annual Festival of Leadership and Learning at Nathan T. Hall Elementary. If you aren't aware, the Festival is a chance for our elementary students to select and research a topic of their choice and create a presentation. These presentations are set up and conducted in the gymnasium, at which time they are scored by a member of the school staff. Students are rated on their research, creativity, public speaking and organization; among other items. It is quite challenging, as all of the students do a fantastic job and demonstrate a level of knowledge and enthusiasm that is remarkable.

I relay this story because it is a point of contrast to the direction schools are being driven in in New York State. Recently, the Governor has chosen to double down the role of high-stakes testing in public education. Interestingly, this is in direct opposition to the vast majority of other states, and most educational experts, who are questioning the wisdom of this approach. To be sure, I don't think anyone in education would argue that testing should be eliminated altogether. The NYS Regents exams have, over the decades, proven to be a sound and reliable measure for high school students and teachers. Additionally, prior to No Child Left Behind, the NYS math and ELA exams administered at grades 4 and 8 served as useful assessments for diagnosing and developing strong educational strategies and programming for students as they moved into the middle and high schools.

Unfortunately, as time has gone on, policy makers have demanded that education be quantified more and more by high-stakes summative exams. The main concern of parents and educators is that this will have the effect of crowding out the very type of learning experience I described in the first paragraph. As the parent of students in 10th grade, 7th grade, and one soon to be in pre-K; I understand these concerns from both sides.

At Newark Valley Schools, we have taken great pains to ensure this doesn't happen to our students. This is not to say our faculty and staff do not take exams seriously- we do. In fact, we take every aspect of our students' education seriously. However, we have not lost sight of the value of a well-rounded education. We want our kids to have a positive educational experience in total. This goes far beyond summative exams. Kids are naturally curious and, in most cases, want to learn. Our staff, and especially our teachers, have worked extremely hard to meet both the demands of the new standards and exams as well as ensuring that we maintain those elements that all of us recognize as critical to a child's love of learning. This has been a tremendous challenge, and an extraordinary amount of hard work, but we will not subscribe to a philosophy that our kids can be reduced to a test score.

In light of proposed policy changes in Albany, this challenge will continue to grow. I want to ensure our parents that we will continue to work to find ways to make your child's education a meaningful and wellrounded experience. We owe our children this, and it is the reason we entered this profession in the first place. Additionally, we will continue to do our best to meet the demands set before us by the State- whether we agree with them or not. This is often the hardest task, but just because it is hard or unreasonable doesn't excuse us of our responsibilities.

In closing, I would like to thank all of you who partner with us in this endeavor. Our community support has been second to none. At the end of the day, what matters is that we keep our kids first. This is something that our community excels at. Sincerely,

Newark Valley Pre-K & Kindergarten Registration

Registration for children who will be attending Pre-K & Kindergarten in the Newark Valley Central School District in September 2015 will be held the week of March 16-20 from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily and on the evening of Thursday, March 19 from 6-8 pm at Nathan T. Hall Elementary School.

Children who will be five years old on or before December 1, 2015 are eligible to enter Kindergarten for the 2015-2016 school year. Children who will be four years old on or before December 1, 2015 are eligible to enter Pre-K for the 2015-2016 school year.

Parents or guardians of children listed in our current school census database will be notified by mail. Please call the Nathan T. Hall Elementary School office at 642-3340 x1 if you have not received a post card by February 27th.

Parents or guardians should bring their child's birth certificate, immunization record and two proofs of residency. Parents are reminded that New York State law requires written proof that all students have immunization against polio, measles, diphtheria, mumps, rubella, varicella (chicken pox) and hepatitis B or medical verification of any of the above illnesses.

Cardinal Wrestlers Put together one of the greatest seasons in Newark Valley Sports History

Coming off a historic 2013-14 season that saw 5 Cardinal grapplers qualify for the state meet, and 3 place in the NYS Championships, the 2014-15 team had some huge challenges to face. The team had graduated 4 outstanding seniors, who had recorded over 500 individual wins in their careers. Not to be deterred by the task, this years grapplers not only matched last years success, but exceeded it on many fronts.

This season saw the Cardinals win the IAC Dual meet championship along with winning the overall IAC tournament, both great accomplishments, (The dual title was the 4th consecutive, while the Tourney was the teams 3rd straight) but the best was yet to come. The team went to the section 4 duals as a #3 seed, and a 13-1 record at the time. The team would string together consecutive wins over Deposit-Hancock, by 5 points, and Union-Endicott by 1 point to advance to the finals against Vestal. With an electric atmosphere, and a strong Newark Valley crowd, the Cardinals would wrestle their best match of the year beating Vestal 52-27, crowning the Cardinals as the best dual meet team in all of section 4 regardless of school size or class. It was the 1st time in 13 consecutive trips to the tourney that the team had won the overall title.

With the dual meet portion of the season completed, (The team would end the year 17-1), the boys focused on sectionals. The team would once again rise to the challenge, and wrestled an amazing tournament. 14 Cardinal grapplers would place in the section with 6 making the finals. In the finals the Cardinals were going to have to wrestle very well to win a title. The Championships would begin with 8th grader Benny Baker winning his 2nd straight sectional title with a Technical fall over his opponent in the finals. Sophomore Gianno Silba and senior Cole Ford would lose tough hard fought matches to Johnson City opponents, setting up the last 3 matches for the Cardinals. Senior Vinnie Darpino would record a workman like win at 160 for a 2nd consecutive Sectional title. Vinnie was followed by sophomore David Crow who pulled off a stunning win at 182 pounds. Trailing 4-2 with 40 seconds left in the match David would throw his opponent to his back and record a pin, this win would secure the Cardinals title by 1 point over Vestal. At 285 senior Jon Williams would take on a very tough state ranked Johnson City wrestler, but would come up short 3-1 in overtime. For the first time in school history the team would leave the sectional tournament as team Champions. All 16 Cardinals who wrestled in the tourney contributed to the teams success.

The team would like to say a special thank you to their seniors who provided great leadership throughout the season. Captains Vinnie Darpino (160) (section Champion) and Cole Ford (132) (2nd in the section), 138 pounder Dylan Williams (4th in the section), 170 pounder Travis Ford (6th in the section), and 285 pounder John Williams (2nd in the section). They would also like to thank all of the parents, fans, bus garage, custodians and staff for all of their support throughout the year.

MS Student Places in Scholastic Art & Writing Competition

Kelsey would like to have a career in photography when she gets older and chose to focus her time in Family & Consumer Science photographing women and girls engaged in activities that are traditionally male dominated. Kelsey then used an online photo editor called "Be Funky" to adapt the photographs she took, adding artistic stylization.

Kelsey said the title of her work was inspired by a song called "Just a Girl" by the band No Doubt. The song's lyrics are about difficulties associated with being a girl and feeling like you don't have the same rights or privileges as boys. The singer says, "the moment that I step outside, so many reasons for me to run and hide". Kelsey wanted to show girls empowered by engaging in activities often associated with boys so she switched the lyric to communicate the opposite feeling; not running and hiding but shining and standing out instead.

In this, the 72nd year of the Museum's association with the program, 809 works were entered for adjudication. Kelsey was the only middle school student in our entire New York and Pennsylvania region to receive recognition in the category of digital art. We are very proud of her accomplishment and hope you will come see her art on exhibit at the Arnot Art Museum in Elmira. Her work will be on display beginning the first of February.


Alumni Return for Q&A Session
